## **Environmental Tips**

Excerpts from an article by Ingrid Justice entitled *Our Environment: Energy Efficiency for Body and Planet* 

Today 85% of our country's power comes from carbon-based fossil fuels, including petroleum gas and coal. Solar energy currently accounts for only .5% of US energy usage, but is steadily growing 20-25% per year.



The sun not only provides a **clean**, **efficient** way to power our homes, but it also supplies the cleanest fuel for our bodies. **Whole food** in its natural form comes from all the nutrients we need for optimal health. Processed foods are many steps removed from their natural state. The healthiest foods are also the best for our environment.
